

Based on teacher reports




Sixth Form Standards


University (UCAS)





- Early applications sent by Monday 16th October
- Any course at the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, or for most courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry.
- All other applications sent by Wednesday 31st January
- Personal Statements 1st draft should now be uploaded on Unifrog.
- References Written by subject teachers/tutors.

Applying

Apply for student finance on the Gov.uk website. The quickest and easiest way to apply is online at www.gov.uk/studentfinance. GOV.UK

Tuition Loan

You could get a Tuition Fee Loan of **up to £9,250** if you're studying at an eligible university or college. This is the cap for tuition fees in England.

Eligibility

UK nationals

You'll be eligible for student finance if all of the following apply:

- . you normally live and work in England
- you've been living in the UK, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man for three years before starting your course

And you're:

- . a UK national or Irish Citizen, or
- settled under the EU Settlement Scheme, or
- granted indefinite leave to remain for other reasons

Maintenance Loan

How much you can get depends on when you start the course, where you live and your household income

Student Finance – Summary

STUDENT FUNDING FOR 2023/24

- In England, tuition fees are capped at £9,250 per year.
- Student loans of up to £9,250 a year are available to cover tuition.
- Repay loans when you're earning at least £27,288 per year.
- Maintenance loans of up to £13,022 can help with living costs.
- Hardship funds are available from universities.

For the 2023/24 academic year, you'll receive up to:

- £8,400 if you're living at home
- £9,978 if you're living away from home, outside of London
- £13,022 if you're living away from home, in London
- £11,427 if your UK course incorporates a year spent studying abroad.

As it can take up to six weeks to process a student loan application, you should aim to **apply for your loan by 31 May if your course starts between 1 August and 31 December**. You don't need to have a confirmed offer of a place on a course before applying.

Apprenticeships and Degree Apprenticeships



An **apprenticeship** is a paid job where the employee learns and gains valuable experiences.

- paid employment with holiday leave
- hands-on-experience in a sector/role of interest
- at least 20% off-the-job training in a college, university or training provider
- formal assessment which leads to a nationally recognised qualification

Name	Level	Equivalent
Intermediate	2	5 GCSE's at a pass
Advanced	3	2 A level's at a pass
Higher	4, 5, 6 and 7	Foundation degree and above
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or Master's degree

A **degree apprenticeship** enables you to gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work. Degree apprenticeships take three to six years to complete, depending on the course level.

You'll spend most of your time working and you'll also study part-time at university. For example, you might go to university one or two days per week, or in short blocks, such as a week at a time.

Overall, you spend about 20% of your time studying vs. 80% of your time working.

Gap Year

- Take time to think about the direction they wish to head in.
- Gain experience before deciding.
- If planned, make sure it is purposeful. How do they want to spend their gap year? Look at jobs, volunteering and travel.

Our advice

Apply now anyway!

If you still want a gap year at the end of the year, defer your offer.

If you decide you want to go to university now, you already have offers.

If you decide to change course, then re-apply next year.

What to expect

- 1. Students should be completing at least one hour of independent work for every one hour in a lesson.
- For students with 3 subjects, this works out at around 15 hours of independent study per week.
- This should be a combination of work set by the teacher and routine study tasks.
- There's no such thing as "no homework".

What can you do

- Don't let attendance slip
- Read the weekly newsletter for upcoming opportunities
- Contact the tutor if you have concerns
- Watch out for signs of stress let us know
- Don't let paid work get out of balance (max 8 hours / week)
- Ask students what they are doing and get them to talk about it!
- Offer to test them on things it does help
- Check homework on satchel:one
- Make sure they download exam papers and mark schemes from exam-board websites. They do need to test themselves regularly although it does not always have to be completing a past paper.


